Sabot National Champion

The typical marine layer draped gloomily over Mission Bay as 10 families from BCYC arrived to represent the club in the Junior Sabot National Championship. After six weeks of preparation, the entire summer sailing season would draw to an end with this regatta, a total of 11 races. The parents and three exceptional coaches, BCYC Sailing Director Pete Dodosh, Mark Gaudio and Cameron MacLaren supported the sailors and created a team more than ready to take on the other clubs. On day one, the depressing gray blanket burned off, replaced by outstanding 10-knot winds, which persisted for the rest of the week — the best conditions I had seen in my seven years participating in this championship.

Thanks to the BCYC coaches, our team remained lighthearted and fairly mellow while many of the other teams were apprehensive. The shifty winds, similar to Newport Harbor, helped the BCYC sailors qualify in the best flights possible. The following days of championship racing were very competitive, as the top 15 boats in Gold Fleet were within points of each other. After the first day, I placed sixth, leaving me with a chance to move up some places, or drop much lower.

Coming into the next day a little nervous, saw my best performance; yet I questioned my ability to sail well in such a small boat, as I took a yearlong break to sail larger CFJ's. By the fifth race in the championship, I had moved up to second, seven points out of first. Everything came down to the last race. My anxiety was almost unbearable, but I knew that I needed to keep my patience and my mind on the task at hand in order to succeed. At the start, I overheard the PRO

I want to update my friends at BCYC on my adventures. Balancing professional sailing and managing the One Design department at Ullman Sails Newport Beach can be exhausting. Luckily, they complement each other well.

January 2013 – The new year started with a bang. I returned from two weeks in New Zealand with my wife on our belated honeymoon and got right back into sailing, racing with BCYC member Karl Pomeroy in the Sunkist Series on his new J-70. Great fun, fast boat! Then it was off for Key West Race Week on a Melges 24. Unfortunately, it didn't end well as another boat hit us, eliminating us from the last day of sailing.

February – After the Whitney Series on the Santa Cruz 50, *Horizon*, and a practice day on *Dark Star*, a Farr 40, came the SYCA Midwinter. Practice paid off and we won the first Farr 40 regatta of the year. By the third weekend I was on my way to Acapulco to sail on *Ruahtu*, a Concordia 47. It was great fun and a bonus to learn some new sailing terms in Spanish. I found time to be part of a panel discussion at an Ullman Sails seminar in San Diego while a snowstorm forced postponement of our scheduled seminar in Buffalo, NY.

March – March began with me trailering a Los Angeles-based Melges 24, *WTF*, to compete at Bacardi/Miami Race Week. It is always a treat to sail in the warm, flat water off Miami. Upon my return, I spent three days coaching Etchells, J-70 and J-120 racers. Then it was off to the San Diego NOOD regatta, competing in the J-120 class. The month ended with a very productive instrument calibration on *Horizon*, and then racing the Cabo Race in very light winds on the same boat.

April – Spring began with a little Etchells coaching and then CFJ and J-120 sail testing. Ullman Sails does them all, big and small. After another practice day, *Dark Star* was ready for the Farr 40 invitational at California Yacht Club. Charleston Race Week was next, aboard the Melges 24, always exciting racing against many talented teams. Speeds hit the high teens as we jib-reached back to the dock on the final day, after racing was canceled due to high winds (up to 40 knots). The only good part about being put away early was I got a jump on the drive to Chicago where the next Melges 24 regatta was. After a flight home, it was time for the Newport to Ensenada race aboard *Horizon*.

May - Yachting Cup is one of my favorite regattas, and I

was excited to do it aboard *Dark Star* in the Farr 40 class. Then it was off for the seminar in Buffalo as well as a stop in Cleveland for back-to-back seminars. Fortunately, I was home in time to sail with my old friend Biff on his Henderson 30. Mid-week sail testing on a Cal 20 and coaching on a Farr 40 was a good warm up for Cal Cup back on *Dark Star*. The month finished with CFJ sail testing, Etchells coaching, and competing in the Around Catalina Race on *Horizon*.

June – I wisely decided not to participate in the Delta Ditch Run and the Coastal Cup in San Francisco in order to look after my wife, post foot surgery. By late June I was back sailing on the Melges in Chicago. The boat owner had a family emergency, forcing us to drop out of the competition. This did allow me to get on the road with the boat and back to California in time for Long Beach Race Week on the always fast and fun *Dark Star*.

July – We started the Transpac Race aboard *Horizon*. While it was a long, light-wind race, we won our class for the third Transpac in a row, finishing in 10.5 days. Our reward – cold drinks and a couple relaxing days in Hawaii.

August – I am on to Chicago for the only United States stop on the World Match Race Tour. The downside to this great experience is that I missed sailing with my wife, Jennifer, in the BCYC Club Championship! We had so much fun last year and will make every effort to sail in this event in 2014. 

TDML, BLM, EPA

Ahoy. Boaters are more active this year. Boat show attendance is up and you are using your boat more often. Shipyards are busy and monies are being spent maintaining or repairing boats of all sizes and types – great for all!

The cost of maintaining your boat will increase due to more regulations, including a proposed TMDL (Total Daily Maximum Load) if imposed by the Southern California Regional Water Quality Control Board (SCWQB).

A TMDL will set restrictions on copper levels in Newport Bay and will have a profound effect on all boaters. Copperbased bottom paint has been identified as a major polluting culprit. If boaters were deprived of this paint, the cost of boating would increase to a level that would put it out of reach for many people, a point substantiated by previous Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) testing.

Amazingly, the standard currently used by the SCWQB is based on toxicity studies done using distilled water, not salt water. Copper has a very different reaction in salt water – toxicity is

The fishing was incredible as they caught their limit every day and had to release many fish. Per angler per day, you are allowed to keep one king and five Coho/silver. You have to release the small Chinook (king), hoping you will catch a bigger one.

vastly different. Also, copper resides naturally in salt water.

If a TMDL is set, the BCYC marina could be limited to an arbitrary number of vessels the SCWQB finds safe to the environment. And the model to base that number on could be Promontory Bay, an enclosed small bay, very different from our marina that is located near the harbor entrance.

In 2002, the EPA asked states to develop state-specific standards. *However, California and several other states did not comply.* As a result, the EPA set the standard for California. Now, Recreational Boaters of California (RBOC) is asking the state board to approve a Biotic Ligand Model (BLM) for metals in saltwater, which is currently under final review by the agency. This BLM is a formula that lets harbors come up with a number specific to the water body, taking into account PH and carbon levels, as well as other elements. The EPA's approval of the BLM will provide the water quality board with a science-based approach to retest water bodies.


If adopted by EPA, the model will allow for more accurate marine and estuarine water quality criteria to be developed to protect the environment, and to create more <u>scientifically</u> <u>defensible</u> regulatory actions, rather than the arbitrary, one-size-fits-all method that is currently used.

I am asking you to let your legislators know to accept the BLM formula for water quality. Help keep boating on the water! Go to rboc.org for a copy of a letter to send them and for additional information

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
