Someone told me on New Year's Day: "Well, you only have 11 months to go, Commodore!" My first reaction was, we are just getting started, and my second reaction was, please don't count, let's just enjoy working through the year. Goals for 2014 will be focused on these three key areas: (1) membership growth and retention, which you will hear parroted throughout the year by myself and our membership chair, Director EB Barden; (2) completing an update of our Strategic Plan; and (3) completing the downstairs remodel while working around club events and programs.

I view membership growth and retention as not just the job of a few committee members, but a challenge I give each and every member. One of the highlighted goals of the 2009 Strategic Plan was to get membership to cap-out dues-paying members and have a waiting list. However, dues-paying members have been in a decline since 2009, along with non-dues-paying memberships increasing. Factors for the decline include general economic conditions and aging members migrating to non-dues-paying status, or resignations and moving out of state.

January/February 2014

I have always believed that knowledge is power, and our awareness of BCYC's many activities and offerings empowers us to not be shy about getting current members to the club for events or reaching out to potential new members as guests. While we can renew this goal in the 2014 Strategic Plan, the real-time implementation comes from proactive teamwork of all members. Our calling card, unlike our neighboring clubs, is ownership of our land, clubhouse and marina, premier programs, staff, bill of fare, and events. This spirit came through New Year's Eve with increased attendance over last year, reaching 117 members and guests. It was a fantastic event, and not only was a good time had by all, but several guests expressed interest in joining as a result.

Additionally, 2014 will see a remodel of our downstairs restrooms, replacement of doors and windows in the multi-purpose and junior rooms, a repositioning of the rear exterior stairway down to the pool from the banquet room to open up this space, and installation of a three-stop commercial elevator to enhance access and service to each level of the club, creating more member-use opportunities. In the end, 2014 will reflect what we make it, and my goal, with your support, is to help make it great.



As the cold fronts start rolling through, it gets a little harder to drag yourself out on the water for a chilly, windy and possibly rainy practice. Like many sailors from this area, their thoughts are now occupied with snowy mountains and how fast they can ski down them. As we settle into winter we can all rest well looking back on all of the hard work we put in last fall. We practiced at least once each week and jammed in five regattas in a span of a little more than two months. Many of our newer team members finally got the hang of racing and what to expect at practices and regattas. We reviewed racing strategy, starting, tacking, boat handling, mark rounding and sail trim. As funny as it sounds, I am proud to say that our C3 level Sabot sailors can now survive in over five knots of breeze.

Looking forward to spring, I anticipate an even larger program. Many of our Sabot sailors are getting their feet wet in CFJs and are looking forward to sailing in our spring CFJ racing program. We will team up with BYC for several practices over the next season so our sailors have the chance to race against other yacht clubs on a more regular basis. Everyone knows it is always more fun when there are more boats on the starting line. We are even getting together with BYC for a few clinics to be held in the near future. Full Throttle, Baby

Ahoy. I am very humbled, and happy, to have been asked to stay on as BCYC's Port Captain. Thank you for your support and assistance.

When was the last time you ran your boat to **full** engine RPM and cleared your engines? Did you get full factory-required RPM? Did you see black smoke or black particles in the water when you started your engines or generator?



Getting factory-required top RPM is extremely important to the life and health of your engine(s). This helps keep them from running in "lugging" mode. Engines in this mode will not burn fuel completely, costing you in lost miles per gallon and building up internal gunk, causing inefficiencies over time.

Tuning your prop(s) to attain full RPM, with the boat at **full weight**, is mandatory (full weight means full fuel, water and two to four persons on board for a sea trial). You should have your props (and shafts) tuned every four to five years as *preventive maintenance*. Set props to attain your correct RPM – your shipyard will assist with this.

Now is also the best time to haul out and have a new coat of bottom paint applied.

Your engines should be/need to be run at full throttle **regularly**, especially if you spend most of your time in the harbor. This helps to remove unburned fuel and should be done every time you leave the harbor and before you reenter, and applies to power and sailboats. Sixty seconds can be enough, but five minutes is better – at full throttle.

While underway, watch your gauges as they can tell you a lot about the inside of your engine.





LEMWOD 2013



Jane Hoffner Horst is the captain of Team Pilikia and this all-women's team once again represented BCYC in the prestigious Linda Elias Memorial Women's One Design regatta (LEMWOD). Hosted by Long Beach Yacht Club Oct. 19 and 20 in Alamitos Bay, nine teams raced in their fleet of Catalina 37s in seven buoy races. Competition was tough, with very talented, experienced teams representing Cal, King Harbor, Newport Harbor, San Diego and Southwestern Yacht Clubs as well as the Sea Gals, WSA of Santa Monica, and WSA of Long Beach/Los Angeles. This premier event is now in its 22nd year and is dedicated to the memory of Linda Elias, an accomplished Southern California racer who died of ovarian cancer in 2003.

Skippered by Jane, the team comprised 11 talented women with experience in buoy, as well as off-shore racing. They are: Merry Cheers-tactician; Rachel Ellis-main trimmer; Julie King, Mary Saleff, Suzanne Schuler, and Beth Wintontrimmers and grinders; Patti Day-pit; Mikki Pieruccionimast; Liz Tran-bow; and Miriam Smith-dedicated squirrel. This was the fourth year we have participated, showing tremendous improvement over last year.

The race committee mapped out tough courses, with four races calling for three times around the marks and three that were twice around. In the first race on Saturday, the team was a bit aggressive at the start and was over early, but steadily made up time to finish in fifth place. The second race was a photo finish – Pilikia came in second. Races three and four resulted in fifth and fourth place respectively, finishing the day in a three-way tie for third place.

The first race on Sunday went well as the team placed fourth. In the second race, the boat got caught on the wrong side of a major shift and never recovered, finishing seventh. The start of the last race was exciting - the teams were very aggressive, resulting in two general recalls. Team Pilikia got a GREAT start on the final try, but soon had a serious problem – as they were coming in on port to the lay line for the first weather mark, the boat in front tacked, leaving them in a position there they wouldn't have had enough room to tack under boats coming up on starboard and make the mark; if they ducked the boats, they would have been dead downwind and in last place. There was a slight opening between two boats coming up on starboard and Jane drove the boat through, causing an egregious foul on the second boat, forcing them to duck them and thus, couldn't make the mark. The judges made Pilikia do two penalty turns and team ended up in seventh place again. As a result, Team Pilikia was fifth overall in this regatta. Said Jane, "I was very proud of our team and honored to have raced with a great group of ladies."

I wrote it in November and I will write again: by the time you read this, BCYC should have a building permit and be in the final stages of selecting a general contractor for renovating the lower level and installing an elevator that will be accessible from all three floors of the building. The Newport Beach Building Department threw us a few more small curves and the yearend holidays slowed everything down. I won't predict a start-of-demolition date, but I want to alert everyone to some coming disruptions. The lowerlevel restrooms, hallway and patio will be torn up, but we will try to provide access to the multi-purpose room and junior areas as much as possible. Bíg Tuna

January and February are not the greatest time for sport fishing in Southern California, although there are still plenty of bottom-fish biting such as calico bass, halibut, rock fish, sea bass and sheepshead. Halibut can be found where the bottom is sandy, while sea bass tend to hang around kelp beds. You can usually find rock fish and sheepshead in deeper water, in holes or canyons along the sea floor water. If trolling, you might have luck catching barracuda, bonita and skipjack.

For those of you who like catching dorado, marlin, tuna and wahoo, you need to be south of Turtle Bay in Mexico.



This time of year, the big yellow fin tuna (250 to 350 pounds) are usually found on a high spot off of Banderas Bay about 46 miles off of Puerto Vallarta, and

18 miles off the Banderas Bay Point

(20.57.05 N, 106.01.19 W). This only happens typically in January and February.

Good luck fishing.





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

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
